

Alfred Lee Anderson, 67, of Greybull, Wyoming, passed away at his home on the early morning of Saturday, February 15, 2025, after his long battle with Interstitial Lung Disease. Alfred was born May 14, 1957, in Miles City Montana, to John and Eleanor Anderson.

Alfred grew up on the Red Canyon Ranch in Shell, WY along with his two brothers. In his younger years, Alfred enjoyed 4-H, FFA, and showing steers. He once won a tractor driving contest at the Wyoming State Fair.

He attended Greybull High School, graduating in 1975 with this year being his 50th class reunion. On December 31, 1987, he married Darla Anderson in Worland, Wyoming. Together they were blessed with two daughters, Kayla Lee and Kirbi Dawn.

After graduating he continued to work at the Red Canyon ranch until 1984 and then drove Truck for Bryant Inc. In 1986, he joined his father at AC Supply in Basin, later transitioning with his father in the operations of J&E Irrigation in 1998 and further becoming the owner. In 2000 he became a Reinke pivot dealer, earning excellence awards for numerous years, as well as earning the largest parts sales increase in North America.

Alfred began his lifetime of volunteer work when he first served with the Shell Fire Department for 10 years. The Big Horn County Fair Board was a major part of this work for 23 years, where he spent numerous hours on the arena project and moving it forward to better the fair. With this, he was also part of the Big Horn County Livestock Sales Committee, Dealer Council for Reinke Manufacturing, and Chairman of the Scharen Subdivision HOA. In addition, he was very dedicated to the youth of Big Horn County with his support at the Junior Livestock Sale. Alfred was a lifetime member of the Elks Club.

Alfred was an irrigation specialist, and many friends and customers relied on his knowledge. He knew every road and history of all the land in the Big Horn Basin. In 2012, Alfred and Darla built their dream home in the Scharen subdivision. He took great pride in perfecting the landscape, making sure the grass was green and well irrigated. He loved growing a large garden and sharing his bountiful harvest. You could always find him cruising in his "buggy" overseeing the subdivision until his health started to decline. He enjoyed spending numerous hours keeping the subdivision roads graded, clear of snow, and maintaining the irrigation system. He enjoyed camping in the Bighorn Mountains with his family. Whenever you saw Alfred, his dogs were by his side. Alfred had a great passion for sports including NFL football, Nascar, and Basketball. Early on Sunday mornings, you would find Alfred sending his weekly text updates to a special cousin Jay Terrett and longtime friend Rob McDougal. Alfred loved his grandchildren ("The Noise") and was fortunate to have them by his side daily at work and at home. They fulfilled each of his days.

Alfred is proceeded in death by his parents, daughter Jennifer Anderson, son Tige Good, father-in-law Darrel Anderson, mother-inlaw Jeanette Elmore, brother-in-law Doug Sabo & granddaughter Whitley Miller.

Alfred is survived by his wife Darla of 37 years. Daughters, Cassie (Virgil) Capellen of Cody, WY, Kayla (Dallas) George of Billings, MT and Kirbi (Mike) Miller of Greybull, WY. Brothers, John Ed (Gina) Anderson of Shell, WY and Larry (Alisa) Anderson of Shell, WY. Sisters-in-law, Dawn Sabo of Gering, NE, Darcy (Heman) Trenkle of Casper, WY and Timmy Anderson of Shell, WY. Alfred has six grandchildren, Ali, Piper, Oaklie, Jersey, Onyx, and Keanu. Many special aunts, uncles, cousins, nieces and nephews.



Many of you may remember Howard in various ways around the Big Horn County Fairgrounds, but there are some distinct ways we will always remember him. Howard almost always had a red solo cup full of ice tea as he was sitting on his gator running from problem to problem, usually a plumbing catastrophe, we all know how frequently the plumbing failed on that fairgrounds. Howard also knew how to tell the best stories, he'd kick back in the bleachers at the show ring, a picnic table, or even the gator and he'd tell you the best story, belting out that deep belly laugh at the end. It echoed across the whole grounds, and everyone knew that was Howie.

Howard grew up in 4-H and FFA, and loved everything about the culture and way of life. He stuck with it after college, starting the agriculture program and running the FFA program in Kaycee for five years. When he and Carol moved back to Emblem to farm with his dad, fair became a part of their lives. Howard was appointed to the fair board, Carol showed vegetables and car loads of flowers until their three girls were old enough to join 4-H. They learned pretty quickly they would need to solve their own problems because their dad was always busy at the fair.

After his time serving on the fair board, Howard transitioned from farming to working a job that allowed him to become the fair manager. When he started on this incredible journey he knew he wanted to keep the hometown feel while drawing crowds to events and helping the youth out as much as he could. He often took the kids that were ornery and gave them a job, teaching them everything he knew, and was always able to see the good that most people couldn't see. For many years, teenagers across Big Horn County would look forward to being a part of his "fair crew". Managing a bunch of teenagers at the fairgrounds couldn't have been easy and probably created more problems than they fixed, but he always treated his crew with respect, made sure they represented the fair well, and had a lot of fun in the process. Howard was a passionate guy. He was passionate about generational futures, agriculture, small towns, hard work ethic, and believing in the community. He worked hard all year to raise money to pay for acts to come perform at the fair. He started early in the spring to make sure the grounds were well cared for, the grass was green, and the paint was fresh. He worked tirelessly to bring in new vendors for the livestock auction to purchase animals from the 4-H and FFA youth. This culminated in 2008, when he was awarded the Rocky Mountain Fair Association, Fair Manager of the Year award. It didn't end there, when the county fair was over, he packed up, drove down to the State Fair and was the Swine superintendent for many years. He made a lot of changes, but it was worth it to see the joy on the kids' faces every year. He often stayed in the dorms with the kids. Because Howard loved everything fair, and that was the real experience. Especially the chance to visit with everyone and anyone - how he loved people!!

Whenever we think of our favorite memories of Howard, they almost all revolve around fair. It was when he was the happiest. It was always a bit chaotic, but he was in his element. He loved people, he loved animals, he loved fair. It was home for him, when he couldn't be home with his family. The laughs we shared, the work, the meals, the drinks, they were all at the fair. When the discussion came up about his memorial fund Howard said there was no question - it had to go to the thing he loved the most after his family - the fair.

We hope this year at the fair, you all get an ice tea, tell a story about Howard, share a good laugh, and remember him. He was a fixture there for many years.






Wayne Mosegard, a lifelong advocate for agriculture, a loving father and grandfather, and a 4-H leader whose impact spanned over three decades was born on January 1, 1946, to Helen (Rubis) and Frank Mosegard in Basin, Wyoming. Wayne was raised on the family farm outside of Manderson. Though he wasn't involved in 4-H as a child, he found his early love for agriculture through raising sheep and cattle and through active participation in FFA at Manderson-Hyattville High School. Whether competing in speech contests or livestock and agronomy judging, Wayne's passion for agriculture was evident early on and carried him through his college years at the University of Wyoming, where he earned a bachelor's degree in agriculture. Wayne returned home after college to farm alongside his father. Together, they raised barley, corn, sugar beets, hay, and managed a sheep feedlot in the winter. But his most important crop was the one he nurtured at home—his four children: Monty, Brenda, Amy, and Erin. Wayne became a 4-H leader when his kids were old enough to join, and for more than 30 years he guided not only his own children but many others in the community through the values and lessons the 4-H program instills. Responsibility, accountability, hard work, and integrity were not just taught - they were modeled by Wayne every single day.

Summers at the Mosegard home meant walking lambs, practicing showmanship, and turning the backyard into a show ring with kids from all around coming to learn and prepare for the fair. For the Mosegard family, the Big Horn County Fair wasn't just an event—it was a tradition, and often, the closest thing to a vacation during busy farming seasons.

Even after retiring from farming and as a 4-H leader, Wayne continued to support the program, attending fairs and proudly cheering on his grandchildren—Ryan, Connor, Brooke, and Bailey - as they followed in his footsteps. Whether it was steers at the Big Horn County Fair or pigs,

goats, horses, sheep, and even a cat and a duck at the Washakie County Fair, Wayne was in the stands with a smile and a heart full of pride. Wayne's dedication to agriculture and to the development of young people through 4-H has left a lasting impression on all who knew him. His legacy lives on through the countless lives he touched and the values he passed down. We are thankful for the lessons he so lovingly taught.





Fair Fun Class


This year we will have a fun class to depict the fair theme: "Echoes of the Past; County Fair Revival"

Interpretation of Policy, Rules, and Regulations:

- * The Fair Manager & Fair Board, referred to as Fair Management of the Big Horn County Fair reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules & regulations to arbitrarily settle all matters, questions and differences in regard there to, connected with or incident to the fair.
- Right is reserved by the Fair Management to formulate * and announce new rules to meet emergencies & adjudicate all matters arising from fair.
- Fair Management reserves the right to direct and regulate in the parking of automobiles or other vehicles or conveyances within the fairgrounds and where they will be driven.
- Fair Management reserves the right to exclude from the fairgrounds any PERSONS, ANIMAL, or BUSINESS (ES) whom it may deem undesirable or who violate any of these rules laid down by management or who may otherwise become offensive.
- Every animal and article upon the grounds will be under the control of the Fair Management. While every precaution will be taken for safekeeping, the Fair Management will not be responsible for any loss or accident.
- Fair Management will guard against extortion in any form practiced on patrons of the fair. Violations of this rule will be cause for forfeit of contracts, all money paid, and will be removed from the grounds as deemed necessary.
- Fair Management reserves the right to determine sizing and positioning of all signs & direct the arrangement of articles on display cases to secure harmony as well as an attractive appearance.
- Solicitors for charity & other needs will not be allowed on the grounds & will be refused admittance unless otherwise agreed and voted upon by the board.

- * Any claim for injury to any person or property will not ever be asserted or suit instituted or maintained against the Big Horn County Fair, its officers or their agents or on behalf of any person, firm or corporation or their agents, representatives or servants or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on the grounds or occupying space.
- Fair Management reserved the right to amend these rules. In the event of conflict between general & special rules, the latter will govern.
- DOGS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED ON THE FAIR-GROUNDS EXCEPT DURING THE DOG SHOW &/OR SPECIAL CONTESTS. Dogs used for the dog show &/or special contests are allowed on the grounds NO earlier than one hour before the show and MUST be removed from the grounds immediately following the conclusion of the show. The dog owner of any dog found on the grounds will be given one warning before being fined \$100.00. The Fair Management may have the dog removed from the fairground property at owners expense. These rules DO NOT apply to service dogs for those individuals with an impairment. Companion dogs are NOT recognized as service dogs.
- * Firearms are prohibited on fairgrounds.
- Fair Management will consider it a great favor if the visitors will report any mistreatment or extortion practice by an employee of the Fair or Concessionaires. Correspondence on all matters in relation to the Fair is solicited, and its officers will promptly furnish information if desired.

Alcoholic Beverages

 No alcoholic beverages on the grounds during fair except in designated areas (beer garden & designated grand stand area)

Entries:

- Exhibitors failing to comply with rules and regulations set forth in this book will be subject to denial of future exhibit privileges. It is best to enter everything you hope to bring to fair. Exhibits not brought are "no shows" and will be scratched from the list during judging.
- Every entry must be made in the name of the owners at the time of entry.
- Late Entries will be charged a \$10.00 late fee per exhibitor after July 1st.
- Any exhibitor submitting entries after July 15th will be charged \$20.00.
- All out of County Entries must pay an entry fee for premium.
- Exhibits erroneously entered may be transferred, at the discretion of the superintendent of the department of which they properly belong. <u>This</u> <u>must be done one hour prior to the start of the</u> <u>show</u> in classes to which they are eligible.

Attention all Exhibitors:

- All Exhibitors are required to cooperate with fair management in all matters of policy, including behavior, parking, etc. Those exhibitors not cooperating may be removed from the premises, may have their entries withdrawn from competition, forfeit all awards and premiums. Arrangements to safely remove their exhibits from the grounds will be immediately.
- * All open and static exhibits will be released on Saturday of the fair at 6:00pm. All **4-H & FFA** livestock will be released Sunday of fair at 8:00am; they'll need to be removed from fairgrounds by 11:00am. Should any exhibits be removed before this time without written permission from the Fair Management, they will forfeit all premiums.

- * All pre-registered 4-H, FFA, Junior & Open Class entry tags can be found at the fair office.
- All livestock shown in the Junior Show must live within Big Horn County boundaries. Livestock shown in the open class can be from anywhere.
- A health certificate is required for all livestock. At any time a licensed Wyoming Veterinarian can ask any animal to leave the fairgrounds if he/she feels there are health concerns or issues.
- Exhibitors will remain in complete control at all times & protect their animals from injury & mistreatment.
 Exhibitors not complying with these rules will be asked to remove their animals from the fairgrounds.
 Serious infraction may cause loss of all premiums earned & forfeiture of showing privileges at the Big Horn County Fair for ONE year..
- Exhibitors will have to clean their own stalls and checkout with the superintendent before they leave fair. No stall fee will be charged. Failure to do so will result in loss of premium money & they will be barred from showing in the next fair.
- Each Open exhibitor who chooses to keep their animals in the fairgrounds must keep their stalls clean & orderly. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums and other awards. Resulting in being barred from showing in the next fair.
- Exhibits must be on the fairgrounds during the designated times during the Big Horn County Fair and are not permitted to be removed from the fairgrounds prior to the release date. Livestock must be in place by Wednesday, July 30, 2025 @ 5:00am and not permitted to leave . Failure to abide by this rule will result in forfeiture of premiums/ awards & asked to leave immediately.

Feed & Bedding

- * Junior (4-H & FFA) exhibitors are responsible for all feed/bedding necessary to maintain his/her animals in a healthy condition. Weed releases will be required for all natural feed. Any inquiries call Big Horn County Weed and Pest at 307-765-2855. Straw will be allowed for bedding as long as it is weed free & certified. No hay or bedding can be stored in barns or in alleys at any time.
- If there are clean shavings provided by the fair they will be located in the "Clean Shavings concrete bunk on the east side of the grounds.
- When cleaning your pens, the used shavings MUST be put in the "USED" shavings concrete bunk on the east side of the grounds.
- When loading & unloading shavings keep the area neat and push the shavings as far back into the bunk as possible.

Payment of Premiums

- * 4-H, FFA, and Junior premiums will be distributed through the Extension Office and FFA Advisors. Youth premiums will not be given out until a complete record book is turned in. Open class premium money will be mailed. The premiums offered by the Fair Management cannot be changed by any judge or superintendent.
- Premium check disputes must be resolved by November 1st. No checks will be issued or corrected after that date.
- Premium Checks must be cashed within 180 days of date on check.

NOTICE:

 The road behind the livestock barn is a fire lane and service road only. Vehicles parked in this roadway for more than 10 minutes will be towed at owners expense.

- Truck & Trailer parking is available in the area between the street and the railroad tracks east of the fairgrounds fence. Absolutely no portable pens in the parking area.
- * There will be NO goat/lamb fitting between the steer barn and the goat barn .

Concessions & Privileges

- Fair Management will have complete control of all concessions or privileges. All concessions will abide by their decisions.
- No event tickets or passes will be furnished to any concession.
- No person or persons will be allowed to sell, give away or take orders for any merchandise, magazines, etc. without written permission from Fair Management.
- Concession privileges, commercial exhibits etc. may be applied for at the Fair Office via our online platform.
- Concessionaires must have a health inspection prior to entering fairgrounds. They must show proof of at least \$500,000 liability policy and \$1,000,000 property damage.

<u>Animals</u>

- Health Certificates are required for ALL livestock including dogs & cats. At anytime a licensed Wyoming veterinarian can ask any animal to leave the fairgrounds if they feel there is a health concern or issues.
- * Breeds with no entries may be dropped from future fairs.
- Drenching as a sole method to source nutrition for an animal is prohibited unless approved in writing by a licensed Wyoming veterinarian and provided to Fair Management.

Campers and Tents

- Reservations for camping can be found at www.bighornfair.com on event hub platform
- * All reservations will be made & paid for online.
- * Firearms are prohibited on the fairgrounds.
- Each Camping spot will come with one parking pass.
 ONLY one vehicle allowed per camping spot. All excess vehicles can use the North Parking lot. Please be sure parking along the street is kept off the roadway.

Superintendents:

- Superintendents will assign stalls to all livestock entries & provide office with a map of the assigned stall/pen/cage assignments of their respective departments. Make sure the stalls are cleaned and animals are taken care of.
- Superintendents shall oversee their respective departments; ensure all exhibits meet class, division and department requirements and are judged and appropriately displayed.
- At the close of the fair, each superintendent will supervise the release of the exhibits and make sure the exhibits are taken home at the designated time set by the Fair Management.
- Each superintendent is requested to submit changes in his/her department for the next year within 10 days after the fair.
- Superintendents shall be familiar with, responsible for following all rules, regulations, guidelines, and policies established by fair management, and will be responsible for enforcing said rules within the respective department/division.

<u>Judges:</u>

- All Superintendents & Judges will need to report to Fair Office 30 minutes prior to scheduled judging.
- Judges are not to award placing to any unworthy exhibits. It is the intention of the Fair Management that no premiums are offered to any animal which is not deserving. These rules will be strictly adhered to, whether there is a competition or not.
- * Judges will report to the superintendent any exhibitor or exhibitors who, in any way, whether in person or by agent Interfere with them during their work or shows any disrespect to them. The superintendent will at his/her discretion demand the exhibitor withdraw from the competition if guilty of such acts.
- Judges are instructed to award, in each instance, only prizes of such grade as merits of the individual animal or article fully justified. Absence of competition will not be accepted as justification for awarding a high class prize to an animal or article of medium or inferior quality.
- When article or animals are not deemed worthy, they will not be rewarded a premium, whether there is a competition or not in the same class.

Protests &/or Grievances

- All protests regarding market animals will be determined by the Jr. Livestock Sale Committee & must be made in writing to the fair office. Only written protests will be considered.
- Protests against an exhibition of an entry must be filed, considered, & determined before 8pm on the day the award was made. It will be considered & determined at the 1st meeting of the Fair Board following fair.

Protests &/or Grievances Continued

- In addition, to the right of protest guaranteed to above interested parties the Fair Management reserves the right to take cognizance of any fraud, consummated or attempted, and to deal with all persons implicated therein in such manner within the limits of power of the board, from evidence relating thereto be deemed just and proper.
- Parties interested will be duly notified of the time and place for considering protest & will be given an opportunity to submit evidence.

Hay Show

 Exhibitors must have their entry sheets, \$10.00 entry fee & their bales of hay to the Fairgrounds no later than July 1st .

Security:

- Police protection & night watchman services will be provided by the Sheriff's Department but provides no responsibility for loss or damage.
- Fair Management claims no responsibility for loss, damage or injury to livestock, person, or other property belonging to any individual while said property is being exhibited or use in connection with the Big Horn County Fair.

Livestock Rules & Regulations:

- All livestock must be in place by 5:00am on Wednesday, July 30th, 2025
- A health certificate is required for all livestock including dogs and cats. At any time, a licensed Wyoming Veterinarian can ask any animal to leave the fairgrounds if he/she feels there are health concerns or issues.

- * Fair Management recommends that you have your animals vaccinated according to your local vets recommendations & is not responsible for any animals contacting a disease or a virus during fair. If any animals shows signs of sickness or disease the exhibitor will be asked to remove the animal from the fairgrounds.
- * NO ANIMAL MAY BE SHOWN IN BOTH MARKET AND BREEDING CLASSES.
- All sheep and goats must have a Scrapies tag. This includes all market and breeding animals.
- Junior (4-H & FFA) exhibitors are responsible for all feed/bedding necessary to maintain his/her animals in healthy condition.
- Cleaning of the stalls, sweeping aisles, washing and feeding of animals should be done by the youth participant.





Junior Livestock Show

General Information:

All 4-H and FFA entries must be pre-registered. You may enter via the web at www.bighornfair.com. Please print receipts. It is best practice to enter everything you hope to bring to fair. Exhibits not brought are "no shows" and will be scratched from the list during judging.

SHOWMANSHIP is separated from Market Classes. Please see the 4-H and FFA sections of the fair book for reference.

- No 4-H or FFA member may stay overnight on the fairgrounds without proper adult chaperones.
- Any member identified with alcohol or drugs will be sent home, will not be allowed to attend the next year's fair and will forfeit all awards, premiums, and trips.
- 4-H, FFA and Jr.. Show premiums will be distributed through the Extension Office and FFA Advisors. Youth premiums will not be disbursed until a completed record book is turned in to the educator.
- Checks can be disputed until November 1st of the current fair year. After November 1st, no checks will be corrected and/or no checks will be issued.
- * General Rules—Animal Science
- * The judge's decision is final.
- * In the case of no competition, the judge will give awards in accordance with merit.
- There will not be separate market classes for each recognized breed of livestock.
- Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance, drug, or the external application of any substance (irritant, counter-irritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animals performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance (except external applications of substances to

- the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only) IS PROHIBITED.
- Surgical procedures performed by a licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal are exempt. Penalty will be two years suspension from exhibiting at the Big Horn County Fair at the discretion of the Resource Board.
- A youth exhibitor is expected to fit his/her own animal at the fair. If assistance is required, only a regularly enrolled 4-H or FFA member is allowed to help. The 4-H educator or FFA advisor will make the final ruling if there are any questions concerning eligibility.
- Drenching as a method to source nutrition is prohibited unless approved in writing by a licensed Wyoming veterinarian and provided to the fair management.
- Market classes will be determined by a committee consisting of the superintendent , FFA advisor, 4-H educator, and Jr. Livestock Sale Committee member. Classes will be established following weigh-ins using logical separations. Each animal is allowed one trip through the scale. Market animals will be sold by weight.
- Animals going to state fair will be required to be fed by seller for 10 days after state fair before going to slaughter. Proof of delivery will be required before you will be paid for your animal.
- Anyone who is unable to show their own livestock at Big Horn County Fair must receive permission from the Jr. Livestock Sale Committee prior to fair and must be shown by an eligible 4-H/FFA member.
- No animals will be allowed out of barns after the fairgrounds are closed without permission of an FFA Advisor or 4-H Educator. <u>*Tie out times are 7pm-8am</u></u> <u>ONLY.</u>
 </u>*

Junior Livestock Show

- Youth exhibitors may enter livestock in all open classes of livestock departments, subject to the following rules:
- There will be no open youth unless a breed class is open due to an open class entry in the same breed and sex class.
- Only 1st & 2nd in any youth livestock classes are eligible in open class. All youth livestock exhibits will be judged prior to open class livestock.
- * A youth horse entry cannot be entered in the same open horse class.
- All cattle will be double tied with proper neck ropes and halters. They should be tied short enough so they can't reach their neighbors feed pans.
- Bulls over two years old must be shown with a nose lead.
- **BRED TO FED:** To be eligible for the bred to fed class, the entry must be owned, fed, and raised in Big Horn County by the exhibitor, start to finish. Grand Champion beef, sheep, swine, and goats receive an award. This information is collected at tagging, and a list is turned into the fair office of eligible participants. Animals **MUST** be shown in the Market Class.
- Animals must meet minimum market weight to participate. There is no entry limit.

<u>4-H & FFA MARKET ANIMAL HERDSMANSHIP</u>

- * Mandatory for all 4-H & FFA Participants.
- Barn superintendents will select one herdsman per barn. Awards received in judging of exhibit classes will not be considered in the score. The superintendents reserve the right not to award a herdsman.

- Each exhibitor must keep their stalls clean and orderly. Failure to do so will result in forfeiture of premiums and other awards.
- Adults helping fit an animal will automatically disqualify the 4-H/FFA member from the herdsmanship award. Minimum direction by parent or leader is allowed or junior aged members. For safety reasons, adults may assist in moving livestock.
- A youth exhibitor is expected to fit his/her own animal at the fair. If assistance is required, only a regularly enrolled 4-H/FFA member is allowed to help. A 4-H Educator or FFA advisor will make the final ruling if there are any questions concerning eligibility.
- * HERDSMANSHIP SCORECARD POSSIBILTY POINT.S: <u>Cleanliness of alleys, stalls of pens:</u> 50 (Consideration ~ general appearance of bedding & alleys)

Big Horn County Junior Livestock Sales Committee Rules

Market Livestock Weight Requirements:

Market Beef: 1150 lbs. Minimum– 1500 lbs. Maximum Market Sheep: 110 lbs. Minimum –160 lbs. Maximum Market Swine: 225 lbs. Minimum - 320 lbs. Maximum Market Goat: 60 lbs.. Minimum Market Rabbit: Pen of 3 (age up to 80 days) 3.5-5 lbs.

Market Rabbit Single (age up to 80 days) 3.5-5 lbs. Market Poultry: Pen of 3: 3.5-6 lbs.

Animals that do not reach minimum weight requirements must be shown as feeders and cannot be sold in sale. <u>Excluding market swine</u>, animals exceeding the maximum weight limit can still show and sell but will only receive payment for the maximum weight. This will be at the judge's discretion. Market Swine exceeding 320 pounds will be allowed to show but will NOT be allowed to sell.

- Youth need to showcase their animals at the Jr. Livestock Sale with pride. Exhibitors need to dress for success. Nice dress shirts, nice pants/jeans without holes and closed toe shoes are required.
- Youth need to wear appropriate shoes at weigh-ins for all species of livestock. No open toed shoes!
- * Animals are weighed one time across a designated scale.
- * Scale is zeroed at the discretion of sales committee.
- Under no circumstances will an exhibitor be allowed to sell more than one animal.
- If your animal is Grand or Reserve Champion in the Jr. Show, and you choose not to sell the Grand or Reserve Champion, you may sell another animal in the regular rotation of the sale.

* <u>A HEALTH CERTIFICATE IS REQUIRED FOR ALL</u> <u>LIVESTOCK</u>

- At any time a Wyoming licensed veterinarian can ask any animal to leave the fairgrounds if he/she feels there are health concerns or issues. These animals will not be allowed to show or sell.
- No drugs of any kind may be used within 30 days of the fair. If your animal must be doctored, the animal must be held at the sellers expense for 30 days. If any animals are condemned for drug use, the seller must return all money to buyer including the sales commission.
- Sale Commission: 4%; lambs, goats, swine, rabbits and poultry: 3% cattle
- All sellers are responsible for feeding, caring and delivery of their animals from the time of ownership until delivered to the slaughter plant or resale truck through October 1st. After October 1st, the seller and buyer will negotiate feed costs.
- All sellers excluding swine, and goats must have proof of ownership and brand clearance before they can go across the scale at weigh ins.
- All animals tag numbers will be verified as the animal enters the sale ring. If you do not have the correct animal, you will be excused and will be allowed to sell your animal at the end of the sale.
- No FFA or 4-H member will be allowed to sell an animal in the Jr. Livestock Sale unless he/she has turned in a completed record book for the previous years project. This rule does not apply to 1st year market exhibitors. The 4-H record book deadline is the 2nd Friday of September. The 4-H Educator and FFA Advisors must provide a list of names of those who have not completed their record books to the Sales Committee one week after their respective deadline dates to make them ineligible to sell.
- Sale is for BIG HORN COUNTY EXHIBITORS ONLY.
 You will not be allowed to sale anywhere else.

Big Horn County Junior Livestock Sales Committee Rules

- * Any animal not in the sale ring on time will be moved to the end of the sales list.
- * Approximately October 1st, all sale proceeds will be dispersed. Checks will be given to the Extension Office and/or FFA advisors for distribution.
- Market lambs must be completely & uniformly slick shorn within 10 days of weigh ins. No more than 1/4". Lambs will be checked at scale to determine class and length of wool.
- Market goats must be uniformly slick shorn with 3/8" of hair or less at the time of arrival on the fairgrounds. Legs may have hair up to the hock & knee only.
- All animals must be CLEAN & DRY when going across * the scale.
- * No decorating of sale animals.
- The Sale Committee will provide the animal's identifi- * cation tags for all market animals. These tags will be used as sale identification numbers. All market animals must be tagged by ownership deadlines.
- * <u>OWNERSHIP DATES ARE AS FOLLOWS:</u> February 1st of current year ~ Market Beef June 1st of current year ~ Market Swine, Sheep, Goats, Rabbits, and Poultry.
- * Regardless of sex, all sheep and goats must have a scrapies ear tag to be allowed on the fairgrounds.
- * FFA members in good standing are allowed to show and sell one year after graduation.
- * All sale animals exhibited on the fairgrounds need to be shown & sold by owner.
- * No mini cattle breeds or highlanders are eligible for the Jr. Livestock Sale.
- Market Sheep and goats must have their milk teeth in place.
- Market beef must be born after January 1st of previous year.
- To promote meat quality assurance and to be show and sale eligible, any market animal welfare issues that may arise will be addressed by the species superintendent, two fair board members and two Jr. Livestock Sale Committee members.

Big Horn County Farm Bureau Federation 4-H & FFA Round Robin Showmanship Species: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat and Horse

- * Grand Champion from 4-H & FFA Showmanship will have first opportunity to enter the Round Robin and must sign up at the clerks by the end of each show. If a showman should be Grand Champion in more than one species, he/she must notify in which species he/ she will enter in the Round Robin Contest. The opportunity will be open to the succeeding showmanship winner until there is a showman in each species. Each species will consist of a Jr. 4-H, Int. 4-H, Sr. 4-H and FFA.
 - <u>RULES:</u>
- * General Rules will be the same as the original showmanship contest in each class.
- 50 pts possible on fitting and showing will be used if a tie breaker is necessary. One of the contestants will draw a class from a hat; both will show that class to be judged by all five judges.
- * Showmen must enter the same animal as they showed in the individual contest.
- Showmen must agree that their animal may be shown by other contestants who are in the contest.
- 15 minute on the 1st class which is your own class, 3 minutes between classes, & 10 minutes on other four classes. <u>Category 1—YOUR ANIMAL</u> POINT.S

- Eligible articles for this division must be original work done by the exhibitor and done within the last 5 years. Copy work or imitation NOT accepted. - * All jars must be clean. Dirt jars will be disqualified.
- All lids will be scratched after judging. Exhibits with * scratched lids will be disgualified. Judges may open jars if placings are close. Entries of vegetables, fruits, and meats must be preserved by approved methods. For canning guidelines & approved methods, contact the Extension office in Basin. A statement of canning method used & processing time must be submitted. Jars cannot be taken for other entries. Attach entry tickets to jar lids. DEFINITIONS: Preserves are fruit in which the tissue of the fruit has been absorbed until its filled with syrup instead of water, Marmalades are usually made from fruits that have some jelly-making gualities, though sliced oranges & lemon may be added. Conserves differ from marmalades in that several fruits may be combined, nuts are allowed.

General Information: Exhibitors are allowed (2) entries in each class. If a flower is to remain fresh throughout the exhibit period, it should be cut no later than the day before it is shown. It is generally recognized that cutting in the afternoon will help ensure a winning entry. Some flowers, such a dahlias & poppies, need to have their stems seared over an open flame immediately after cutting. To encourage the uptake of water in woody-stemmed perennials, such as hollyhocks cut ends of the stem or should be lightly crushed. Always select flowers that are coming into full bloom-not already mature. Flower stems should be cut cleanly at an angle with sharp knife or pruning shears then put into room temperature water. Following cutting & water treatment, specimens should be placed in a cool, darkened room. Leave the flower undisturbed overnight. Flowers predated in this way improve their substance & will hold their freshness longer. Definitions for cut flowers: BLOOM: One individual flower, generally on a single stalk. 

General Dog Show

1. All Dogs must be at least 6 months of age by May 1st of current year to compete at the State 4-H Dog Show & 1 year of age for agility classes.

2. Dogs must have a county health certificate by a veterinarian. No animals will be allowed on the Big Horn County Fairgrounds without a valid health certificate.

3. All dogs must be on a leash (excluding competitions) & under control at all times. Big Horn County Fair rules prohibit any dog from being any place but the campground & official sight of the dog show. Dogs are NOT permitted anywhere near the stock barns. Once the 4-H dog show is complete, all dogs must be removed from the fairgrounds.

4. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring & must be removed from the premises.

5. Females in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes. Spayed, monorchidic, & neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.6. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.

Dog Showmanship

4-H Dog Obedience—Division 5000

1. 4-H member may complete only one obedience class per exhibit with a total maximum of two dog entries. The first song is referred to as "A" dog. The other is referred to as "B" dog for class entries.

2. The first year beginner novice class is for members who are in the first year of their dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not fell competent to start on leash classes. Members may compete in first year beginner novice class only once.

3. A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member, or a dog that has a title from another organization or has three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog by these guidelines: A: Junior & Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level. B: Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved.

4. A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at the designated annual county fair may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member

may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.

5. High in trail will be calculated on the basis of the raw qualifying score plus 5 additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.

6. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.

7. All dogs must enter/leave the show ring & compete with a leash.

8. Bait and/or toys are not allowed in obedience competition.

9. Dogs soiling or urinating the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.

10. Males & Females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class & must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

6. Level one dogs will run on a leash level two dogs must run off leash or with a tab no longer than 6". Collars must be of flat, buckle riding with nothing hanging off of it such as tags.

7. Bait is not allowed in agility competitions.

8. Dogs in season will run at the end of each class.

9. A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.

10. Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels. Division 5002—Under 10"

9. Rally Advance Excellent (RAE) Class only-participation ribbons will be given in the Advance & Excellent classes regardless of qualifying score. If qualifying scores are received in both classes, then placement ribbons will be given.

10. Classes are based on age of the youth in the experience of the dog and include:

a. NOVICE DOG: A dog competing which has not obtained 3 qualifying scores from competitions nor has a Rally title from another organization.

b. PRE-ADVANCED DOG: A dog which has received 3 qualifying scores as a Novice Dog but has not earned a qualifying score as an Advanced Dog.

c. ADVANCED DOG: A dog which has received 3 qualifying scores from competition, received a score of at least 70 points in a Novice Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

D. EXCELLENT DOG: A dog which has received 3 qualifying scores from competition, received a score of at least 70 points in Advanced Dog class, or that has a Rally title from another organization.

E. RALLY ADVANCED EXCELLENT (REA): After receiving 3 qualifying scores from competitions, the handler and dog move up to this level. At this level the handler and dog will compete in both Advance Dog and Excellent Dog classes at the same show. The handler and dog must earn a qualifying score of 70 in each of the classes (Advance & Excellent) to earn ribbons and/or prizes. Handler and dog may show at the level indefinitely.

7. For food safety reasons, meat jerky entries must be prepared using the boiling brine method recommended by the University of Wyoming Cooperative Extension Services, & the recipe must accompany the product. To obtain this recipe contact your extension office or go to the UWCES Food & Nutrition website at www.uwyo.edu/cesnutrition and click on "UWCES Publications." Ground jerky products will be disqualified because they cannot be processed in boiling brine.

4-H Cat—Division 5071

1. Cats must arrive in a cage and are not to be released until presented to the judge at show time. Violators will be disqualified.

2. All cats must be accompanied by a current rabies vaccination certificate, stating that the animal has been vaccinated by a veterinarian in accordance with current recommendations of the Compendium of Animal Rabies Control as prepared by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV). It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within 3 weeks prior to the show. Any cat that appears to be sick or have parasites will be disqualified at the discretion of the judge.

3. The "household pet" cat is of mixed breed or unknown descent.

4. A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.

5. Kittens must be at least 4 months old & not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.

6. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.

7. All cats & kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show & will not be counted down for declawing.

8. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge. No vicious cats.

9. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.

10. Exhibitors must bring their own litter box and litter.

11. Exhibitors must bring their own carpet square during judging.

12. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts.

13. All Cats must remain in their cage when not being shown.

14. Cats must be in a harness and leash at all times.


